### Headline Findings



5,370 businesses with +2% growth 2018-23. 64,400 jobs in 2022, equivalent to +1% growth 2017-22



Apprenticeship starts +5% 2017-23, far better than the -8% decline for Staffordshire



77% employment rate in 2023, higher than regional and national averages. 2.7%

claimant rate and 4.8% youth claimant rate below county, regional and national levels



Highest business survival rate of Staffordshire districts at 65%, higher than county 62%, regional 51% and national 58% averages

### Business Growth and Key Sectors

There were 5,370 businesses based in Stafford in 2023. In 2018-23 there were an additional 90 businesses, +2% growth. This is higher than county +0.3%, but lower than region +3% and in line with nation +2%.


Key sectors include Wholesale & Retail (805 businesses), Professional, Scientific & Technical (720 businesses) and Construction (710 businesses).

Strongest growth between 2018-23 in Accommodation & Food (+60 businesses), Construction (+55 businesses) and Transportation & Storage (+45 businesses).

Notable declines between 2018-2023 in Agriculture, Forestry & Fishing (-45 businesses), ICT (-45 businesses), Professional, Scientific & Technical (-40 businesses).


#### **Total Businesses 2023 and Business Change 2018-2023**



### Business Start Ups and Closures


Stafford Business Start Up Rate for 2022 at 9.5% is below the county 10.1%, region 12.1% and nation 11.6%. Stafford has the lowest Business Death Rate at 9.7% of all LAs, lower than county 11.1%, region 12.7% and nation 12%.

Stafford has the highest business survival rate of all LAs at 65% in 2022 – higher than the county (62%), regional (51%) and national (58%) averages.

## Key Employment Sectors


In 2022 there were a total of 64,400 jobs in Stafford. There has been an increase between 2017-22 of +670 jobs or (+1.1%).

Key Sectors in 2022 include Human Health & Social Work (10,000 jobs), Wholesale & Retail (10,000 jobs), Public Admin & Defence (6,000 jobs).

Strongest growth between 2017-22 in Human Health & Social Work (+1,000) and Public Admin & Defence (+1,000) sectors.

Notable declines in growth between 2017-22 in Manufacturing (-1,000), Accommodation & Food (-1,000) and Construction (-500) sectors.

#### **Key Employment Sectors 2022 and Change 2017-2022**




### **Employment Rate**

77% (62,200 residents in employment) employment rate 2023 in Stafford, lower than county 83%, but higher than regional 75% and national 76% averages.

22% or 17,900 economically inactive residents January-December 2023, higher than county 16%, regional 21% and national 21% averages.

### Occupations

58% of jobs in higher occupation groups in July 2022-June 2023, above the county 50% and national average 53% averages.


36% of jobs in professional occupations higher than the county 27% and national 27% averages.

#### Occupations % (July 22-June 23)






## Median Resident Earnings

Average Annual Earnings by Resident (£) 2018-23

£37,103 average annual resident earnings Stafford in 2023, second highest of all LAs. This is higher than county £34,204, regional £33,121 and national £35,100 averages.

26.5% growth in Stafford annual resident earnings 2018-2023, one of the highest percent increase of Staffordshire LAs and higher than the county +20.7%, regional +20.0% and national +17.6% averages.


## Median Workplace Earnings

£33,673 average annual workplace earnings
Stafford in 2023, the highest in Staffordshire. Stafford is higher than the county £32,223, regional £33,003 averages but lower than the national £35,106 average.

24.2% growth in Stafford annual workplace earnings 2018-2023. Stafford is higher than county +21.9%, regional +19.2% and national +17.6% averages.


#### Average Annual Earnings by Workplace (£) 2018-23




## Productivity (GVA per Job Filled)

Stafford GVA per job filled at £51,662 in 2022 has grown by +14% between 2017-22. This is lower than county level growth of +17%, but higher than the regional +10% and national level +12%.

Stafford GVA per job filled is -4% lower than the county average, -2.8% lower than the regional and -16% less productive than the UK average.





#### **GVA** Growth

Stafford economy in 2022 worth £3.8 billion total GVA. Largest sectors by GVA include Wholesale & Retail £530 million; Real Estate £529 million; Public Admin & Defence £462 million.



Stafford total growth £646 million ( $\pm$ 20%). This is higher than  $\pm$ 18% West Midlands but lower than  $\pm$ 21% growth in England and Staffordshire  $\pm$ 27%.

### Claimant Rate

2.7% Claimant rate in September 2024, lower than county 3.1%, regional 5.8% and national 4.4% averages.


**2,255** claimants in September 2024, +36% increase since March 2020, lower than county +37%, regional +49% and national 47% averages.

4.8% Youth claimant rate in September 2024, lower than county 4.9%, regional 7.5% and national 5.4% averages.

415 youth claimants in September 2024, +32% increase since March 2020, higher than county +27% and national +29% averages but lower than regional +35% average.





## Apprenticeship Starts


Stafford has seen a +5% increase in Apprenticeship Starts 2017/18-2022/23 from 920 to 970, in contrast to the -8% decline across Staffordshire.

Stafford has seen a 171% increase in Higher Level Apprenticeships 2017/18-2022/23 from 140 to 380. This compares with a 126% increase across Staffordshire.

The 25+ age group accounts for the highest proportion of apprenticeship starts in Stafford at 54%.

In 2022/23 the most popular subject choice in Stafford was Business, Administration & Law and Health, Public Services & Care both at 29%.

## Opportunities for Growth & Development



Further develop partnerships and support for new businesses. Stafford Business start-up rate

2023 at 9.5% is below county 10.1%, regional 12.1% and national 11.6% averages, but Stafford has the highest business survival rate of all Staffordshire LAs at 65%



Continue to improve education and skills levels to boost productivity and growth as 34% of adults have RQF4+ qualifications below county 39% and national 47% averages



Continue to attract high skilled jobs to area and grow business base to improve productivity – Stafford already has 58% of jobs in higher occupations, above county and national levels



Address higher than average economic inactivity rate of 22% and declining employment rate trend to support local residents and improve productivity
